



Subject-Matter Competence for the Education Specialist Credential

A candidate for an Education Specialist Credential must demonstrate subject-matter competence, in a minimum of one subject, through one option identified below for the preliminary or intern credential. Subject-matter competence must be met prior to student teaching, or for intern candidates, before being given daily whole class instructional responsibilities or becoming the teacher of record. The Education Specialist Credential authorizes the teaching of all subjects within the specialty area(s) listed on the credential.

The determination of an individual's status as a Highly Qualified Teacher for No Child Left Behind (NCLB) is the responsibility of the employer and independent of the subject-matter competence requirement for the individual's teaching credential.

*Scores must be used for certification within five years of the passing date for each examination.

¹ NCLB Core Academic Subject Areas include English, economics, reading/language arts, mathematics, history, science, arts, geography, civics/government and foreign language which may be demonstrated in California by the passing the following Commission examinations or completing a Commission-approved subject matter program:

- art
- English
- music
- mathematics, including foundational-level mathematics
- foreign language
- science, including foundational-level general science or specialized science
- social science

In addition, the elementary level is an NCLB Core Academic Subject Area which may be demonstrated in California by passing the appropriate Commission examinations for the Multiple Subject Credential.
