SUBJECT: UPDATE - Examination Score Standards and Appeal
Procedures

In order to keep all candidates and constituents informed, the Commission updates its examination score and appeal standards. Enclosed is a copy of the current Score Standards, which apply to examinations until July 31, 1980, and a copy of those standards prior to July 31, 1979. Also enclosed is a copy of the Examination Appeal Processes: one which applies to examinations taken through the November 1978 testing and the second which applies to examinations taken after February 1, 1979. The examination, CLEP English Composition with Essay, was adopted in December 1978, and this requirement became effective September 1, 1979. The CLEP examination requirement applies to all candidates seeking an English Credential by examination, and to everyone who has not completed a Ryan approved teacher preparation program.

It is important that a candidate be informed that two fees are required when using an examination score on the appeal process: a \$30 processing fee for the examination appeal, and a \$30 application fee for the credential.

I would appreciate it if you would circulate this information to the appropriate people on your staff and encourage them to make copies available for all candidates. Credential analysts and testing officers also should be encouraged to give copies to the students with whom they deal.

EXAMINATION SCORE STANDARDS - UPDATE

The Commission for Teacher Preparation and Licensing, at its June 1979 meeting, extended the use of the National Teacher Examinations and adopted new cut-off scores effective to July 31, 1979.

EXAMINATION APPEAL PROCESS *

The Commission for Teacher Preparation and Licensing, at its January 1977 meeting, adopted Examination Appeal Regulations. This appeal process is applicable only to examinations relating to the Multiple and Single Subject Teaching Credentials taken prior to February 1, 1979.

The adopted appeal procedures states that:

Effective July 1, 1976, the Common Examination scores may be considered for appeal if all of the following (1, 2 and 3) are met: (Applicable only to exam prior to the February 1979 examinations.)

- (1) the score is at least equivalent to the 25th percentile among California candidates at the same test administration;
- (2) the candidate has either -
 - (a) an overall grade point average of 3.0, or
 - (b) an excess score in one area of the Common Examinations equivalent to at least twice the shortage in the area(s) in question;
- (3) a grade point average of 2.5 has been earned in at least 12 semester hours of course work in the area(s) in question.

Effective July 1, 1976, Single Subject Matter Area Examinations scores may be considered for appeal if all of the following are met: (Applicable only to exam prior to the February 1979 examinations.)

- (1) the score is at least equivalent to the 40th percentile among California candidates at the same test administration provided that at least 100 California candidates take the examination; if fewer than 100 California candidates take the examination, the score must be equivalent to the 40th percentile among national examinees at that test administration;
- (2) the candidate has an overall grade point average of 2.5;
- (3) the candidate has a grade point average of 3.0 in at least 18 semester hours of course work in the subject area for which the examination is to be waived;

and

Effective November 3, 1977, the Single Subject Matter Agriculture Area Examination score may be considered for appeal if all of the following criteria are met: (Expires February 1979)

- (1) a formula score equivalent to passing 40th percentile of the items;
- (2) an overall grade point average of 2.5;
- (3) a grade point average of 3.0 in at least 18 semester hours of course work in the subject area for which the examination is to be waived.

Commission policy provides that anyone meeting these standards who took the examination after July 1, 1974, and up until February 1, 1979, may request an appeal by writing to the Commission; providing evidence required above, including a copy of the report of scores and complete transcripts; and submitting the required \$30 processing fee for each examination to be considered. This fee is not refundable. Scores will remain valid and may be used for appeal purposes for two years following the date of the examination on which the score was achieved.

If an applicant fails a subject matter examination between July 1, 1974 and February 1, 1979 and does not meet the standards stated in 1, 2 and 3 above, or does not meet the criteria for appeal effective February 1, 1979, he may appeal by requesting to be examined by a Board of Examiners. Such an appeal shall be in writing and shall include all of the following:

- (1) verification that appellant has failed the examination and does not meet the standards stated in 1, 2 and 3 above;
- (2) agreement by the appellant to pay the costs for impaneling and operating the Board of Examiners.

This fee will be the actual costs to assemble a Board of Examiners. A maximum fee of \$250 must be paid prior to the scheduling of the examination. After actual costs have been determined, a refund of any unearned portion of the fee will be paid to the applicant.

The Commission shall appoint Boards of Examiners as appropriate, each consisting of not more than six persons drawn equally from practicing public school teachers and full-time higher education faculty in the subjects or field(s) in which the candidate wishes to be examined. All examinations held by such Boards shall be executive and closed sessions with only Board members, Commission members and staff, and the applicant permitted to attend. The recommendations of each Board of Examiners shall be in writing. A copy of such recommendations shall be transmitted to the Commission and the Commission will notify applicants of its decision by registered mail within 30 days after the Commission considers the recommendations of the Board.

The oral examination will be given at a location or locations designated by the Commission. No more than two such examinations shall be scheduled in one year for each subject matter area. This oral examination shall cover the substance specified in the adopted Scope and Content Statement appropriate to the subject matter area being examined, and shall be scheduled for no longer than 3 hours.

EXAMINATION APPEAL PROCESS *
Effective with the February 1979 Test Administration

The Commission for Teacher Preparation and Licensing, at its December 1978 meeting, adopted the following Examination Appeal Regulations effective with the February 1979 and subsequent test administrations. At the December 1979 meeting of the Commission, Section (a) below was modified as indicated by the underlined portion. This change becomes effective February 1, 1980. This appeal process is applicable only to examinations relating to the Multiple and Single Subject Teaching Credentials.

The Commission will consider appeals presented in writing by applicants who have failed to attain the passing score standard established by the Commission when the appellant can verify evidence of meeting the following appeal standards:

- (a) Allow for an Appeal for Extraordinary Circumstances. Within 30 days after a score report for a written examination has been received for any certificate or credential issued by the Commission, an unsuccessful applicant may file a petition of appeal with the Executive Secretary on the grounds of fraud, discrimination, clerical error in scoring, or other extraordinary improper acts or circumstances which were reported to the test supervisor at the time of the administration of the examination and which a reasonable person could agree deprived the candidate of a fair chance to take and pass the examination; except that mere failure to pass an examination which has been successfully passed by other applicants shall not be grounds for appeal.
- (b) The petition shall be in writing and shall state the facts, information or circumstances upon which the appeal is based and in sufficient detail to identify the examination and persons involved. The petition shall be signed and dated by the applicant, and shall include the following statement: "I certify under penalty of perjury that the facts stated herein are true and correct."
- (c) The petition may include other relevant information including the petitioner's academic record, letters of recommendation and other facts upon which the Commission might reasonably conclude that, but for the grounds for appeal alleged, the petitioner would have demonstrated all qualifications required by law for such credential or certificate.
- (d) The petition, with the Executive Secretary's recommendation with respect thereto, shall be granted or denied by the Commission on the basis of the verified facts presented in the petition. The Commission may order re-examination of the petitioner upon all or any portion of the examination appealed from with or without further examination fee.
- (e) Applicants who fail a subject matter examination and do not meet the standards may appeal by requesting to be examined by a board of examiners. Such an appeal shall be in writing and shall include all of the following:

- (1) Verification that appellant has failed the examination and does not meet the standards; and
- (2) Agreement by the appellant to pay the costs of impaneling and operating the Board of examiners.

A candidate meeting appeal standards effective prior to February 1, 1974, must

- (1) send a written request for an appeal with the required \$30 processing fee. This fee is not refundable.
- (2) include copies of the N.T.E. test results.
- (3) send transcripts of all collegiate course work. Transcripts should be secured from each separate college attended. (Only if test taken between July 1, 1974 and February 1, 1979.)
- (4) include documentation of any improper acts or circumstances which deprive the applicant of a fair opportunity to pass the examination.

A candidate wishing to appeal under the new regulations effective February 1, 1979, should write to the Commission for Teacher Preparation and Licensing for appropriate forms. These forms must be included with each appeal.

NOTE: After a successful appeal, the only fee required will be the \$30 application fee. To speed processing, include a copy of the notification letter from this office with the application materials.
