SUBJECT: Appeals For The Emergency Clinical Rehabilitative Services
Credential in Language, Speech and Hearing Including the
Special Class Authorization

Title 5 Regulations allowing for the initial issuance of an Emergency Clinical Rehabilitative Services credential expired on July 1, 1984. Unfortunately, this school year several special classes for the aphasic were in danger of going without teachers because the emergency credential was no longer available. So, at its November 2, 1984, meeting, the Commission approved an administrative grant code to assist districts having difficulty finding teachers for their aphasic classes.

R-GA-19 reads as follows:

The applicant seeks issuance of an emergency clinical rehabilitative credential and meets the following conditions:

1. He/she must hold a clear or life clinical rehabilitative credential authorizing service in language, speech and hearing;
2. The districts/counties document the places they have sought fully credentialed people and have been unable to find them. The employers explain the contacts made including the dates and what they will do in the future to find fully credentialed people;
3. The applicant must show evidence of enrollment in a program for the special class authorization;
4. The emergency credential will be issued for one year and renewed once on completion of six semester hours of course work in a special class authorization program. The six semester hours must have been completed during the one-year issuance of the emergency credential.
