Status of Legislation

This agenda item provides an update on Commission sponsored legislation as well as bills that the Commission is monitoring or has taken a position on.

Note: There are currently no measures on which the Commission has adopted a position.

2019-20 Sponsored Legislation

AB 525 (Luz Rivas) - Teacher credentialing

Introduced: February 13, 2019

Last Amended: March 19, 2019

Status: Scheduled to be heard on June 5 in Senate Education Committee

Summary: This bill would make a series of minor and technical policy changes to the Commission's statutes. Changes include opening special education and services credentials to education majors, strengthening the Commission's authority to conduct workforce research, and updating outdated terminology.

<u>AB 1219 (Jones-Sawyer) – Teacher credentialing: certificated employee assignment</u> monitoring

Introduced: February 21, 2019

Last Amended: April 3, 2019

Status: Awaiting assignment by Senate Rules Committee

Summary: This bill would require the Commission to administer a State Assignment Accountability System for assignment monitoring. The bill would authorize annual monitoring of all teacher assignments each year, and require this information to be made publicly available in a searchable format. The bill would identify the monitoring authority for a local educational agency, and would require a monitoring authority to review and determine any potential misassignments reported in and identified through the system for local educational agencies within its authority.

AB 1765 (O'Donnell) - Teacher credentialing: adverse action

Introduced: February 22, 2019

Last Amended: n/a

Status: Referred to Assembly Education Committee

Summary: This bill would require the highest priorities of the Commission in exercising its authority to impose adverse action for the protection of children, the education profession, and the public, and would require the Commission, wherever possible and if consistent with these priorities, to impose adverse action that is intended to aid in the rehabilitation of the credential applicant or credential holder.

Additional Notes: This is a two-year bill.

2019-20 Legislation of Interest

The Legislature is currently immersed in the first year of the two-year 2019-20 legislative session. Bills introduced but not passed out of their house of origin are dead until 2020. Policy committees have until July 12 to hear and pass bills. Upon adjournment of session on July 12, the Legislature will begin its summer recess.

Credentialing

AB 182 (Luz Rivas) - Teacher credentialing: computer science: workgroup

Introduced: January 10, 2019

Last Amended: April 2, 2019

Status: This bill was held in the Assembly Appropriations Committee

Summary: This bill would create a workgroup, with specified membership, to determine if the development of a single subject computer science credential is necessary, and to consider requirements for that credential. The bill would require the Commission, on or before January 31, 2021, to provide a report of the workgroup's findings to the appropriate policy and fiscal committees of the Legislature, the Governor, and the Superintendent of Public Instruction. These requirements take effect only upon the appropriation of funding by the Legislature. **Additional Notes:** The prior version of this bill added computer science to the list of authorized subjects for a Single Subject teaching credential. It was amended into a workgroup at the request of the Education Committee. However, the author has stated her intent to re-introduce a credential bill in a future year.

AB 988 (Berman) – Teacher credentialing: out-of-state prepared education specialist teachers

Introduced: February 21, 2019

Last Amended: April 4, 2019

Status: Scheduled to be heard on June 5 in Senate Education Committee **Summary:** This bill would authorize the Commission to allow an applicant for an Education Specialist credential to demonstrate the area of concentration based on two years of experience in California, while the candidate holds the preliminary credential.

AB 1214 (Melendez) – School employees: training: cardiopulmonary resuscitation

Introduced: February 21, 2019

Last Amended: May 16, 2019

Status: Awaiting assignment by Senate Rules Committee

Summary: This bill would require a local educational agency to offer a course in CPR for the purpose of providing this training to interested certificated and classified staff. The bill would further require that if a school district or charter school offers any interscholastic athletic program, they are required to provide CPR certified individuals on-site for the event.

Additional Notes: Previously, this bill would have prohibited the Commission from renewing a teaching or services credential unless the applicant has completed, or is currently enrolled in, a basic course in cardiopulmonary resuscitation. While the amended version still requires additional CPR training for certificated staff, it no longer impacts the Commission.

Early Childhood Education

AB 6 (Reyes) - Early childhood education: Early Childhood Education Branch

Introduced: December 3, 2018

Last Amended: April 2, 2019

Status: Awaiting assignment by Senate Rules Committee

Summary: This bill would establish, within the Department of Education, the Early Childhood Education branch in order to ensure a holistic implementation of early childhood education programs and universal preschool. The bill would require the office to have specified responsibilities, including the responsibility of coordinating services with the State Department of Social Services and the California Health and Human Services Agency.

Additional Notes: The February legislative update noted that the Commission had suggested clarifying amendments. The author has amended the language in question.

AB 123 (McCarty) - Early childhood education: state preschool program: access: standards

Introduced: December 3, 2018

Last Amended: April 29, 2019

Status: Awaiting assignment by Senate Rules Committee

Summary: Among other things, this bill would require the Commission, on or before July 1, 2020, to update the requirements for early childhood education permits. Specifically, the bill requires that, as of July 1, 2028, head teachers in a state preschool program with a teacher permit or higher have earned a bachelor's degree with an emphasis or major in early childhood studies or child development, obtained at least 24 units in early childhood studies or child development, and obtained any other practicum and alternative certificates as determined by the Commission.

General

AB 221 (Garcia) – Teachers: third-party contracts: prohibitions

Introduced: January 16, 2019

Last Amended: April 12, 2019

Status: Ordered to the inactive file at the request of the author

Summary: This bill would prohibit, commencing with the 2020-21 school year, a local educational agency, as defined, from entering into a contract with a third-party organization to employ teachers who commit to teaching in the organization for less than 5 years, employ teachers to teach at any school maintained by the local educational agency that has at least 40% of its pupils being from low-income families, or pay the organization any fee associated with interviewing or hiring a teacher candidate.

SB 428 (Pan) – Pupil health: school employee training: youth mental health first aid

Introduced: February 21, 2019

Last Amended: May 17, 2019

Status: In the Assembly awaiting committee assignment

Summary: This bill, contingent on an appropriation made for these purposes, would require the Department of Education to identify an evidence-based training program for a local educational agency to use to train classified and certificated school employees having direct contact with pupils on youth mental health first aid.

Teacher Recruitment

AB 1041 (Weber) - Teachers: Uplift Teaching Corps Act of 2019

Introduced: February 21, 2019

Last Amended: March 26, 2019

Status: Assigned to the Assembly Education Committee. Hearing canceled at the request of author.

Summary: This bill would establish the Uplift Teaching Corps Grant Program, to be administered by the Commission. The program would provide one-time competitive grants to school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools to establish new or expand existing teacher-based residency programs for purposes of recruiting and retaining prospective resident teachers with high degrees of instructional and cultural competence to teach in high-needs schools, as provided. The bill would be contingent upon an appropriation in the annual Budget Act.

Additional Notes: The author's office has indicated that this will be a two-year bill.

AB 1119 (Eduardo Garcia) - Substitute teachers: small school districts

Introduced: February 21, 2019

Last Amended: April 11, 2019

Status: This bill was held in the Assembly Appropriations Committee

Summary: This bill would require the Commission to establish a Teacher and Substitute Shortage Workgroup to identify steps that can be taken to improve both the substitute pool and the qualified teacher workforce in small school districts, defined as a school district with fewer than 2,501 units of average daily attendance. The bill would require the workgroup to examine, at a minimum, current laws and regulations governing the issuance of substitute permits and recommend changes to those laws and regulations.

AB 1623 (Robert Rivas) - Teacher Recruitment: Golden State Teacher Grant Program

Introduced: February 22, 2019

Last Amended: May 16, 2019

Status: Awaiting assignment by Senate Rules Committee

Summary: This bill, subject to an appropriation of moneys by the Legislature, would establish the Golden State Teacher Grant Program, under the administration of the Student Aid Commission to provide a grant to each student enrolled in an approved teacher credentialing program who commits to working in a high-need field, as defined, for 4 years after the student receives a preliminary teaching credential. The Commission on Teacher Credentialing would be

required to identify grantees who fail to earn a teaching credential, and would have the authority to designate additional high-need fields beyond those identified in the bill.

AB 1658 (Wendy Carillo) – Teacher credentialing: adult education: workgroup

Introduced: February 22, 2019

Last Amended: April 11, 2019

Status: Awaiting assignment by Senate Rules Committee

Summary: This bill would require the Commission to convene a workgroup to study issues relating to adult education teacher credentialing, including reciprocity with the community colleges, the credentialing process, the cost and availability of required coursework, and the impacts of pupil attendance. The workgroup would be composed of specific members. The bill would also require the workgroup to submit a report on its findings and recommendations to the Legislature.
