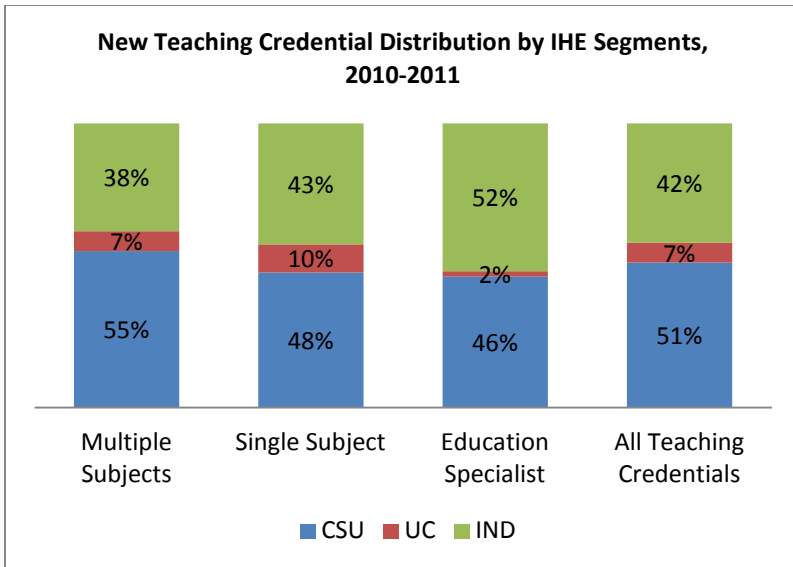




New credentialed Teachers – Where did they receive their bachelor degrees?

In 2010-11, more than 15,000 new teaching credentials were recommended by the Institutions of Higher Education (IHEs)*. More than 6,000 credentials were issued in Multiple Subjects, another 6,000 in Single Subject, and more than 3,000 in Education Specialist credentials.



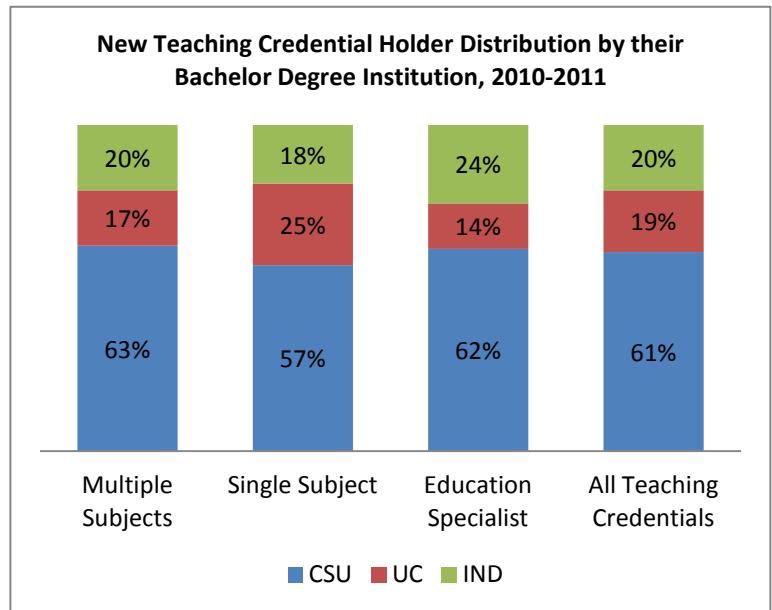
Out of these new Multiple Subjects teaching credentials recommended by California IHEs, the CSU recommended more than half (55%), UC 7%, and Independents (IND) 38%. However, the share of Single Subject credentials was as follows: 48% for CSU, 10% for UC, and 43% for IND. For Education Specialist, the distribution was 46% for CSU, 2% for UC, and 52% for IND.

Overall, CSU prepared more than half (51%), IND more than two-fifths (42%), and UC less than one-tenth (7%) of the total new teaching credentials recommended in 2010-11.

In looking at the number of bachelor degrees earned for those recommended for initial teaching credentials by IHEs in 2010-2011, the share of bachelor degrees (for those later certified to teach in Multiple Subjects) was as follows: CSU (63%), UC (17%), and IND (20%). However, the share of Single Subject credentials distribution was very different – more than half (57%) for CSU, one-fourth (25%) for UC, and less than one-fifth (18%) for IND. The bachelor degree distribution for Education Specialist credentials was CSU (62%), UC (14%), and IND (24%).

Overall, almost two-thirds (61%) of the initial teaching credential holders earned bachelor's degrees at CSU and the remainder were earned at UC (19%) and IND (20%).
